Subject: i) Abatement of Cold Wave and Cold Day conditions over northwest India after 24 hours.

ii) Dense to very dense fog conditions over many parts of Punjab and Haryana & Chandigarh during next 24 hours and decrease in intensity & distribution thereafter.

Weather observed during past 24 hours ending at 0830 hrs IST of today:

- Minimum temperatures are in the range of 1-5°C in many parts of plains of northwest India and in isolated pockets over adjoining area of Madhya Pradesh. The Lowest Minimum Temperature of 0.0°C observed Bikaner (Rajasthan).
- Dense to very dense fog observed in most parts of Punjab, Haryana; in some areas of West Uttar Pradesh; in isolated pockets of East Uttar Pradesh and Sub Himalayan West Bengal; Dense fog in some areas of East Madhya Pradesh; in isolated pockets over Himachal Pradesh, Bihar, West Madhya Pradesh, Assam & Meghalaya and Tripura today morning.
- Cold Day to Severe Cold Day conditions prevailed in many parts of Punjab, Haryana, Chandigarh, Delhi, Uttar Pradesh, West Madhya Pradesh; in some areas of East Rajasthan; isolated pockets of West Rajasthan, Bihar and Cold Day conditions in isolated pockets over Uttarakhand.
- Cold Wave to Severe Cold Wave conditions prevailed in many parts of East Madhya Pradesh; in some areas of East Rajasthan; isolated pockets of Himachal Pradesh, Haryana, West Rajasthan and Cold Wave conditions in many parts of West Madhya Pradesh; isolated pockets over Punjab, West Uttar Pradesh.

Weather Forecast and Warnings (Annexure I & II):

Weather Systems and associated rainfall/snowfall

- A Western Disturbance now seen as a trough in middle tropospheric westerly winds along Long. 55°E to the north of 30°N. Under its influence, light/moderate scattered to fairly widespread rainfall/snowfall over Western Himalayan Region during 07th-09th January, 2023.
- In quick succession, another Western Disturbance is likely to cause scattered to fairly widespread rainfall/snowfall likely over Western Himalayan Region during 10th-13th January and light isolated rainfall over adjoining plains during 11th-13th January, 2023

Minimum Temperature Forecast & Cold Wave Warning

Due to approaching of two Western Disturbances in quick succession, minimum temperatures are very likely to rise gradually by 3-5°C over many parts of Northwest India during next 3 days and no significant change during subsequent 3 days. As a result:

- Cold wave to severe cold wave conditions in isolated pockets very likely over Rajasthan and Cold wave conditions in isolated pockets over Punjab, Haryana, Chandigarh & Delhi, Uttar Pradesh and Madhya Pradesh during next 24 hours.
- Fall by 2-4°C in minimum temperatures very likely over Bihar during next 2 days and no significant change during subsequent 3 days. No significant change in minimum temperatures very likely over Madhya Pradesh during next 24 hours and rise by 2-4°C during subsequent 3 days.

Fog and Cold Day Warning

- Due to continuation of prevailing light winds and high moisture near surface over Indo-Gangetic plains, dense to very dense fog very likely to continue in some/many parts during night & morning hours over Punjab, Haryana, Chandigarh during next 24 hours and over Uttar Pradesh during next 48 hours; in isolated pockets thereafter for subsequent 3-4 days over the region.
- Dense fog in isolated pockets very likely over North Madhya Pradesh, Bihar, Sub Himalayan West Bengal & Sikkim, Assam & Meghalaya and Nagaland Manipur, Mizoram and Tripura during next 2-3 days; Himachal Pradesh, Uttarakhand and West Rajasthan during next 24 hours.
- Cold Day to severe cold day conditions very likely in many parts of Punjab, Haryana, Chandigarh & Delhi, Bihar and Uttar Pradesh during next 2-3 days; in isolated pockets over Rajasthan and Madhya Pradesh during 24 hours; Cold Day conditions in isolated pockets over Uttarakhand and West Rajasthan during next 48 hours.
- Ground frost conditions in many places of north Rajasthan, Punjab, Haryana and north Madhya Pradesh during next 24 hours and abate thereafter.

Annexure I

Impact expected and action suggested due to <u>dense to very dense fog</u> in the night/morning hours in some/many pockets over Punjab, Haryana, Chandigarh and Uttar Pradesh during next 2-3 days.

Impact expected:

Transport and Aviation:

- May affect some airports, highways and railway routes in the areas of met- subdivision.
- Difficult driving conditions with slower journey times.
- Some road traffic collisions
- Power Sector:
- Chances of Tripping of Power lines in the very dense fog routes
- Human Health:
- Lung related health impacts: Dense fog contains particulate matter and other pollutants and in case exposed it gets lodged in the lungs, clogging them and decreasing their functional capacity which increases episodes of wheezing, coughing and shortness of breath
- Impact on people having asthma bronchitis: Long time exposure to dense fog may cause respiratory problem for people having asthma bronchitis and other lung related health problems.
- Causes Eye Irritation: Dense fog contains pollutions of various types and these Pollutants in the air if exposed may tend to irritate the membranes of the eye causing various infections leading to redness or swelling of the eye.

Action suggested:

> Transport and Aviation:

- Careful while driving or outing through any transport.
- Use fog lights during driving.
- Be in touch with airlines and Railway and State transport for schedule of your journey.
- Power Sector:
- To keep ready Maintenance Team
- **Human Health:** To avoid outing until unless emergency and to cover the face.

Impact expected and action suggested due to Cold Day/Severe Cold day conditions in isolated/some parts over Punjab, Haryana-Chandigarh-Delhi, Uttar Pradesh and Rajasthan during next 2 days.

Impact expected:


- An increased likelihood of various illnesses like flu, running/ stuffy nose or nosebleed, which usually set in or get aggravated due to prolonged exposure to cold.
- Do not ignore shivering. It is the first sign that the body is losing heat. Get Indoors.
- Frostbite can occur due to prolonged exposure to cold. The skin turns pale, hard and numb and eventually black blisters appear on exposed body parts such as fingers, toes, nose and or earlobes. Severe frostbite needs immediate medical attention and treatment.
- Impact on agriculture, crop, livestock, water supply, transport and power sector at some places.

Action suggested:

- Wear several layers of loose fitting, light weight; warm woolen clothing.
- Cover your head, neck, hands and toes adequately as majority of heat loss occurs through these body parts. Wear several layers of loose fitting, light weight; warm woolen clothing rather than one layer of heavy cloth.
- Eat vitamin-C rich fruits & vegetable and drink sufficient fluids preferably warm fluids to maintain adequate immunity.
- Avoid or limit outdoor activities.
- Keep dry, if wet, change cloths immediately to prevent loss of body heat. Wear insulated/waterproof shoes.
- Warm the affected area of the body slowly with lukewarm water; do not rub the skin vigorously.
- If the affected skin area turns black, immediately consult a doctor.
- Maintain ventilation while using Heaters to avoid inhaling toxic fumes.
- Take safety measures while using electrical and gas heating devices.
- Extreme care needed for vulnerable people.
- Seek medical attention as soon as possible for someone suffering from frostbite/ Hypothermia.
- Protect livestock from cold weather.

Heavy Rain: 64.5 to 115.5 mm; **Very Heavy Rain:** 115.6 to 204.4 mm; **Extremely Heavy Rain:** >204.4 mm.

Region wise classification of meteorological Sub-Divisions:

1) **Northwest India:** Western Himalayan Region (Jammu-Kashmir-Ladakh-Gilgit-Baltistan-Muzaffarabad, Himachal Pradesh and Uttarakhand); Punjab, Haryana-Chandigarh-Delhi; West Uttar Pradesh, East Uttar Pradesh, West Rajasthan and East Rajasthan.

2) Central India: West Madhya Pradesh, East Madhya Pradesh, Vidarbha and Chhattisgarh.

3) **East India:** Bihar, Jharkhand, Sub-Himalayan West Bengal & Sikkim; Gangetic West Bengal, Odisha and Andaman & Nicobar Islands.

4) **Northeast India:** Arunachal Pradesh, Assam & Meghalaya and Nagaland, Manipur, Mizoram & Tripura.

5) West India: Gujarat Region, Saurashtra & Kutch, Konkan & Goa, Madhya Maharashtra and Marathwada.

6) **South India**: Coastal Andhra Pradesh & Yanam, Telangana, Rayalaseema, Coastal Karnataka, North Interior Karnataka, South Interior Karnataka, Kerala & Mahe, Tamil Nadu, Puducherry & Karaikal and Lakshadweep.
