Subject: (i) Under the influence of Low-Pressure Area over northwest Bay of Bengal & adjoining West Bengal-north Odisha coasts, isolated heavy to very heavy rainfall very likely over Gangetic West Bengal on 30th; Jharkhand on 31st; over Odisha during 29th August-1st September with isolated extremely heavy falls over Odisha on 29th & 30th August 2026.

(iii) Subdued rainfall activity likely to continue over Peninsular India during next one week.

Realised weather during past 24 hours ending at 0830 hours IST of today, the 29th August, 2026:

- ❖ **Very Heavy rainfall (12-20 cm)** has been recorded over Jammu-Kashmir, Haryana, East Madhya Pradesh, Odisha, Bihar
- ❖ **Heavy rainfall (7-11 cm)** has been recorded over Himachal Pradesh, Uttarakhand, Punjab, East Rajasthan, West Madhya Pradesh, Konkan, Madhya Maharashtra, Arunachal Pradesh, Assam, Mizoram, West Bengal & Sikkim, Jharkhand

Weather Systems, Forecast and Warnings (Annexure I & II):

- ❖ The western end of **monsoon trough** is north of its normal position and eastern end is near its normal position at mean sea level.
- ❖ Under the influence of cyclonic circulation over northwest Bay of Bengal & adjoining West Bengal-north Odisha coasts, a **low-pressure area** formed over the same region. It is likely to become more marked and move west-northwestwards across north Odisha-Gangetic west Bengal during next 48 hours.
- ❖ Yesterday's low pressure area northeast Uttar Pradesh & neighbourhood has become less marked. However, the associated **cyclonic circulation now lay** over East Uttar Pradesh & neighbourhood in lower tropospheric level.
- ❖ The **Western Disturbance** now seen as a cyclonic circulation over north Pakistan & adjoining north Punjab between lower and middle tropospheric levels.

Under the influence of above systems, the following weather is likely:

Northwest India:

- ❖ **Isolated to Scattered** rainfall likely over Jammu-Kashmir-Ladakh-Gilgit-Baltistan-Muzaffarabad during 29th-30th August and during 2nd-4th September; Himachal Pradesh during 29th-30th August and on 4th September.
- ❖ **Isolated to Scattered** rainfall likely over rest parts of northwest India.
- ❖ **Fairly Widespread to Widespread** rainfall likely over Jammu-Kashmir-Ladakh-Gilgit-Baltistan-Muzaffarabad during 31st August-1st September; Himachal Pradesh during 31st August-3rd September; Uttarakhand during 29th August-4th September.
- ❖ **Fairly Widespread to Widespread** rainfall likely over East Uttar Pradesh during 1st-4th September.
- ❖ **Isolated thunderstorm & lightning** likely over Jammu-Kashmir-Ladakh-Gilgit-Baltistan-Muzaffarabad during 29th-30th August; Uttarakhand during 29th August-4th September.
- ❖ **Isolated heavy rainfall** likely over Jammu-Kashmir-Ladakh-Gilgit-Baltistan-Muzaffarabad during 31st August-2nd September; Himachal Pradesh during 31st August-3rd September; Uttarakhand on 30th August and during 2nd-4th September; West Uttar Pradesh during 2nd-4th September; East Uttar Pradesh during 30th August-4th September with isolated **very heavy rainfall** also likely over Uttarakhand on 29th August and during 31st August-1st September.

Central India:

- ❖ **Isolated to Scattered** rainfall likely over West Madhya Pradesh during 29th August-4th September; East Madhya Pradesh during 1st-2nd September; Vidarbha during 30th August-2nd September.

- ❖ **Fairly Widespread to Widespread** rainfall likely over East Madhya Pradesh during 29th-31st August and during 3rd-4th September; Vidarbha on 29th August and during 3rd-4th September; Chhattisgarh during 29th August-4th September.
- ❖ Isolated **thunderstorm, lightning & gusty winds (speed reaching 30-40 kmph gusting to 50 kmph)** likely over West Madhya Pradesh during 29th August-2nd September.
- ❖ Isolated **thunderstorm & lightning** likely over East Madhya Pradesh during 29th August-2nd September.
- ❖ Isolated **heavy rainfall** likely over West Madhya Pradesh on 29th August and during 3rd-4th September; East Madhya Pradesh during 30th August-1st September and on 4th September; Vidarbha during 29th-30th August and during 3rd-4th September; Chhattisgarh on 29th August and during 2nd-4th September with isolated **very heavy rainfall** also likely over East Madhya Pradesh on 29th August and during 2nd-3rd September; Chhattisgarh during 30th August-1st September.

East India:

- ❖ **Fairly Widespread to Widespread** rainfall likely over Andaman & Nicobar Islands, Gangetic West Bengal and Jharkhand during 29th August-4th September; Sub-Himalayan West Bengal & Sikkim during 30th August-4th September; Bihar on 29th August; Odisha during 29th August-2nd September.
- ❖ **Isolated to Scattered** rainfall likely over Sub-Himalayan West Bengal & Sikkim on 29th August; Bihar during 30th August-4th September; Odisha during 3rd-4th September.
- ❖ Isolated **thunderstorm, lightning & gusty winds (speed reaching 40-50 kmph gusting to 60 kmph)** likely over Andaman & Nicobar Islands during 30th August-1st September; Gangetic West Bengal during 29th-31st August; Odisha during 29th August-1st September, **with gusty winds (speed reaching 30-40 kmph gusting to 50 kmph)** likely over Sub-Himalayan West Bengal & Sikkim during 29th August-1st September; Jharkhand during 29th August-2nd September; Bihar during 29th August-4th September.
- ❖ Isolated **heavy rainfall** likely over Sub-Himalayan West Bengal & Sikkim during 30th August-1st September; Gangetic West Bengal on 29th August and during 31st August-1st September; Jharkhand during 29th-30th August and during 1st-2nd September; Bihar during 29th August-1st September; Odisha during 29th-30th August and during 2nd-3rd September with isolated **very heavy rainfall** also likely over Gangetic West Bengal on 30th August; Jharkhand on 31st August; Odisha during 31st August-1st September.
- ❖ **Isolated extremely heavy rainfall likely over Odisha on 29th & 30th August.**
- ❖ **Moderate to severe lightning activity over Gangetic West Bengal on 29th August.**

Northeast India:

- ❖ **Fairly Widespread to Widespread** rainfall likely over Arunachal Pradesh during 29th August-1st September and during 3rd-4th September; Assam & Meghalaya and Nagaland, Manipur, Mizoram & Tripura during 29th August-3rd September.
- ❖ **Isolated to Scattered** rainfall likely over Arunachal Pradesh on 2nd September; Assam & Meghalaya and Nagaland, Manipur, Mizoram & Tripura on 4th September.
- ❖ Isolated **thunderstorm & lightning** likely over Arunachal Pradesh, Assam & Meghalaya and Nagaland, Manipur, Mizoram & Tripura during 29th August-2nd September.
- ❖ Isolated **heavy rainfall** likely over Arunachal Pradesh on 29th August, on 31st August and during 3rd-4th September; Assam & Meghalaya on 29th August and during 31st August-4th September; Nagaland, Manipur, Mizoram & Tripura during 29th-30th August with isolated **very heavy rainfall** also likely over Arunachal Pradesh and Assam & Meghalaya on 30th August; Nagaland, Manipur, Mizoram & Tripura on 31st August.

West India:

- ❖ **Fairly Widespread to Widespread** rainfall likely over Konkan & Goa during 29th August-4th September.
- ❖ **Isolated to Scattered** rainfall likely over Gujarat Region, Madhya Maharashtra, Marathwada and Saurashtra & Kutch during 29th August-4th September.

South Peninsular India:

- ❖ **Isolated to Scattered** rainfall likely over Coastal Andhra Pradesh & Yanam, Lakshadweep, North Interior Karnataka, Rayalaseema, South Interior Karnataka, Tamil Nadu, Puducherry & Karaikal and Telangana during 29th August-4th September; Kerala & Mahe during 30th August-1st September and on 4th September.
- ❖ **Fairly Widespread to Widespread** rainfall likely over Kerala & Mahe on 29th August and during 2nd-3rd September; Coastal Karnataka during 29th August-4th September.
- ❖ Isolated **thunderstorm, lightning & gusty winds (speed reaching 40-50 kmph gusting to 60 kmph)** likely over Tamil Nadu, Puducherry & Karaikal on 2nd September.
- ❖ Isolated **thunderstorm & lightning** likely over Tamil Nadu, Puducherry & Karaikal during 29th-30th August and on 1st September.

Fishermen Warning:

- ❖ **Arabian Sea:** Along and off Somalia & Oman coasts, over many parts of westcentral adjoining some parts of southwest and few parts of north & eastcentral Arabian Sea till 03rd September.
- ❖ **Bay of Bengal:** Off south Tamil Nadu coast, Gulf of Mannar adjoining Comorin area and some parts of southwest Bay of Bengal adjoining south Sri Lanka coast and over Andaman Sea till 03rd September;
along and off West Bengal, Odisha, Bangladesh coasts and over north Bay of Bengal during 29th August to 01st September.
Off north Andhra Pradesh and along and off Bangladesh and Myanmar coasts coast and over some parts of central Bay of Bengal on 30th August,
along and off Myanmar coast adjoining some parts of northeast and eastcentral Bay of Bengal on 01st September.

Weather forecast over Delhi/NCR during 29th August-01st September 2026**Past Weather:**

There has been rise in maximum temperatures by 1°C and no large change in minimum temperatures over Delhi during past 24 hours. The maximum temperatures were 34-35°C and the minimum temperatures are in the range 24-28°C respectively during past 24 hours over Delhi. The minimum temperatures are below normal (-1.6°C to -3.0°C) at isolated places, above normal (1.6°C to 3.0°C) at isolated places and normal (-1.5°C to 1.5°C) at remaining parts of Delhi. The maximum temperatures were above normal (1.6°C to 3.0°C) at isolated places and normal (-1.5°C to 1.5°C) at most parts of Delhi. Generally cloudy sky with surface wind speed 22 kmph gusting to 32 kmph from the west direction prevailed over Delhi during past 24 hours. Partly cloudy sky with surface wind speeds up to 22 kmph likely to prevail from the west direction during forenoon over the region today.

Weather Forecast:

29.08.2026: Partly cloudy sky. The maximum temperatures over Delhi are likely to be in the range of 35-37°C. The maximum temperatures will be above normal (1.6°C to 3.0°C) at most places over Delhi. The predominant surface wind is likely to be from the west direction with surface wind speed reaching up to 20 kmph during the afternoon. The wind speed will increase becoming up to 22 kmph from the west direction during evening and night.

30.08.2026: Partly cloudy sky. The maximum and minimum temperatures over Delhi are likely to be in the range of 35°C to 37°C and 25°C to 27°C, respectively. The minimum temperature will be near normal (-1.5°C to 1.5°C) at most places, and the maximum temperatures will be above normal (1.6°C to 3.0°C) at most places over Delhi. The predominant surface wind is likely to be from the west direction with surface wind speed reaching up to 20 kmph during the morning hours. The wind speed will decrease becoming up to 18 kmph from the west direction during afternoon. The wind speed will decrease becoming up to 15 kmph from the west direction during evening and night.

31.08.2026: Partly cloudy sky. The maximum and minimum temperatures over Delhi are likely to be in the range of 35°C to 37°C and 25°C to 27°C, respectively. The minimum temperature will be near normal (-1.5°C to 1.5°C) at most places, and the maximum temperatures will be above normal (1.6°C to 3.0°C) at most places over Delhi. The predominant surface wind is likely to be from west direction with surface wind speed reaching up to 20 kmph during the morning hours. The wind speed will decrease becoming up to 18 kmph from the southwest direction during afternoon. The wind speed will decrease becoming up to 15 kmph from the southwest direction during evening and night.

01.09.2026: Generally cloudy sky. Possibility of very light rain during afternoon to evening. The maximum and minimum temperatures over Delhi are likely to be in the range of 33°C to 35°C and 25°C to 27°C, respectively. The minimum temperature will be near normal (-1.5°C to 1.5°C) at most places, and the maximum temperatures will be near normal (-1.5°C to 1.5°C) at most places over Delhi. The predominant surface wind is likely to be from the southwest direction with wind reaching up to 18 kmph during the morning hours. The surface wind speed will decrease becoming up to 15 kmph from the southwest direction during afternoon. The wind speed will increase becoming up to 20 kmph from the south direction during evening and night.

Impact Expected and Action Suggested due to very heavy/ extremely heavy rainfall:

- ❖ Isolated extremely heavy rainfall likely over Odisha on 29th & 30th August.
- ❖ Moderate to severe lightning activity over Gangetic West Bengal on 29th August.

Impact expected:

- ❖ Breaking of tree branches, uprooting of small trees like banana, papaya, drum sticks. Strong wind and rain may damage plantation, horticulture and standing crops.
- ❖ Partial damage to vulnerable structures due to strong winds and rain.
- ❖ Minor damage to kutcha houses/walls, huts and roads due to heavy rain.
- ❖ Loose objects may fly.
- ❖ Small ships, trawlers and boats may be affected.
- ❖ Road and rail traffic may be affected due to heavy rain and squally winds.
- ❖ There could be localised landslides, mudslides, landslips, water logging, inundation and flooding over low lying areas.
- ❖ Occasional reduction in visibility due to heavy rainfall.
- ❖ Helicopter services may get affected.

Action suggested:

- ❖ People are advised to keep a watch on the weather for worsening conditions and be ready to move to safer places accordingly.
- ❖ Take safe shelters; do not take shelter under trees, as there could be lightning.
- ❖ In case of expected lightning, unplug electrical/ electronic appliances, immediately, get out of water bodies and keep away from all the objects that conduct electricity.
- ❖ Tourism and recreational activities to be regulated.
- ❖ Onshore and offshore activities to be judiciously regulated.
- ❖ Helicopter services to be regulated.

Agromet advisories for likely impact of Heavy Rainfall

- In **Odisha**, drain excess water from rice, maize, pulses, cotton, pigeon pea, vegetables and nursery beds; keep drainage channels and outlets clear, and postpone sowing, fertilizer application and intercultural operations in waterlogged fields until the soil becomes workable.
- In **Madhya Pradesh**, ensure proper drainage in soybean, cotton, maize and sugarcane fields to prevent waterlogging; postpone vegetable transplanting and provide support to young fruit plants. Undertake propping in sugarcane to minimise lodging.
- In **Chhattisgarh**, ensure continuous and effective drainage in rice, maize, groundnut, minor millets, pulses and vegetable fields to prevent water stagnation. Clean drainage channels in low-lying maize, ginger, turmeric and vegetable fields and provide staking/support to cucurbits, tomato and capsicum.
- In **Vidarbha**, maintain proper drainage in soybean, cotton, maize and other standing crop fields and remove excess rainwater promptly. Postpone fertilizer, plant protection and intercultural operations until the soil becomes workable and provide support to young vegetables and other vulnerable crops against lodging.
- In **Uttarakhand**, avoid irrigation in rice where rainfall is adequate and maintain proper drainage in sugarcane and maize fields. Keep drainage channels clear and provide support to tall crops and vegetables to prevent lodging.
- In **East Uttar Pradesh**, ensure proper drainage in standing crop fields and postpone irrigation, intercultural operations, fertilizer and plant-protection applications during wet conditions. Provide staking/support to young plants, vegetables and horticultural crops.
- In **Arunachal Pradesh**, maintain proper drainage in rice, maize, finger millet, soybean, cowpea, vegetables and orchards to remove excess water. Keep millet fields well drained during panicle initiation and flowering and monitor crops for pest and disease incidence.
- In **Assam and Meghalaya**, maintain proper drainage in crop fields and postpone fertilizer and plant-protection applications during rainfall. Continue sowing of pigeon pea, green gram and sesame only where field conditions are suitable and harvest jute at the small-pod stage.
- In **Nagaland**, maintain 3-5 cm water level in wet rice fields and harvest mature maize cobs during suitable weather.
- In **Manipur**, harvest colocasia and mature ginger during rain-free periods and ensure proper drainage in ginger fields.
- In **Mizoram**, prepare fields for sowing black gram, green gram, soybean, sesame and lentil after maize harvest. Ensure drainage in ginger fields and prevent water stagnation to minimise soft-rot and rhizome-rot incidence.

- In **Tripura**, maintain adequate soil moisture in Aus rice during panicle initiation and booting, while ensuring drainage in low-lying groundnut fields to prevent stagnation.
- In **Jharkhand**, maintain proper drainage in all crops and protect vegetable seedlings from heavy rainfall. Keep harvested produce in safe, dry places and monitor rice, maize and red gram for pest and disease incidence.
- In **Bihar**, maintain proper drainage in standing crops and avoid field operations under excessively wet conditions. Maintain appropriate standing water in transplanted rice while avoiding prolonged stagnation.
- In **West Bengal**, keep drainage channels clear in rice, vegetable fields, orchards and nurseries. Protect vegetable seedlings from heavy rain, improve drainage around cucurbits and avoid nitrogen application during wet conditions.

Agromet advisories for likely impact of Thunderstorm / Gusty Winds

- Shift the harvested produce in safer places or cover the produce with tarpaulin sheets in the fields. Tie the harvested crops securely and cover them to minimize the risk of displacement from strong surface winds.
- Provide mechanical support to horticultural crops and staking or support to vegetables and young fruit plants / fruit-bearing plants to avoid lodging due to strong winds.

Livestock / Poultry / Fisheries

- ❖ Keep the animals inside the shed during heavy rainfall and provide them balanced feed.
- ❖ Store the feed and fodder in a safe place to prevent spoilage.
- ❖ Construct an outlet with proper netting around the ponds to drain excess water, thereby preventing fish from escaping in the event of overflow.

Flash Flood Guidance:

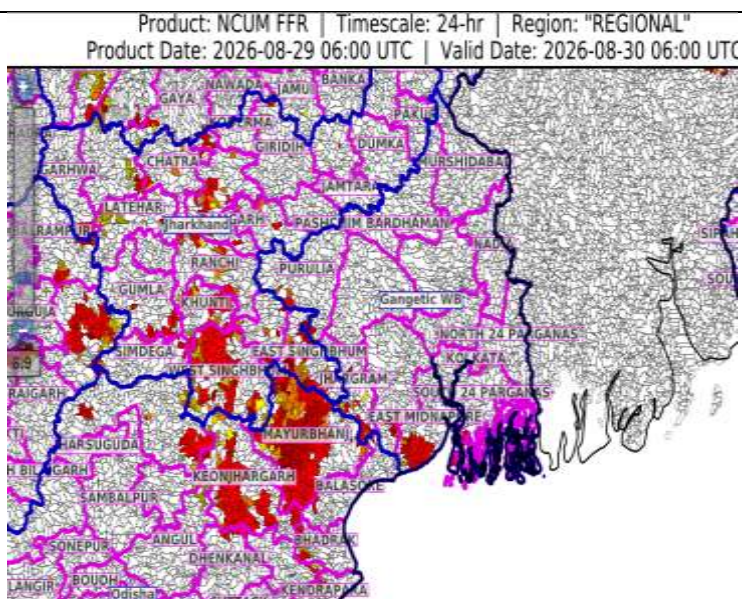
24 hours Outlook for the Flash Flood Risk (FFR) till 1130 IST of 30-08-2026:

Low to Moderate flash flood risk likely over few watersheds & neighbourhoods of following Met Sub-divisions during next 24 hours.

Odisha - Balasore, Bhadrak, Dhenkanal, Keonjhar, Mayurbhanj and Sundargarh districts.

Gangetic West Bengal - East Midnapore, Jhargram, Purulia and West Midnapore districts. Jharkhand - East Singhbhum, Khunti, Seraikela-Kharsawan and West Singhbhum districts.

Surface runoff/ Inundation may occur at some fully saturated soils & low-lying areas over Area of Concern (AoC) as shown in map due to expected rainfall occurrence in next 24 hours.

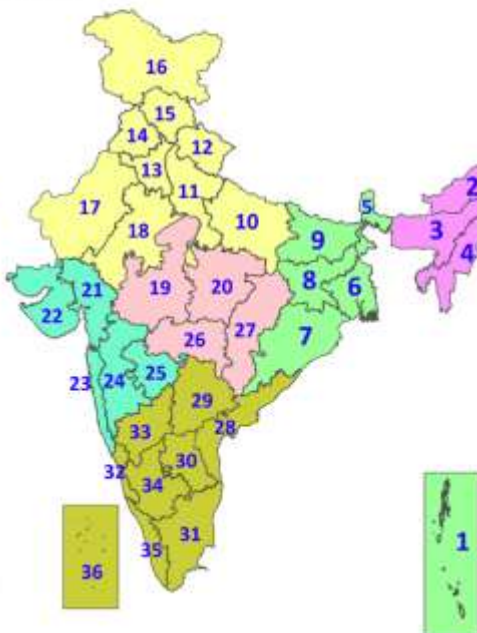
